PUBLIC NOTICE

Our attention has been drawn to a purported video making round social media aimed at tarnishing the image of our institution

The video publication contains untrue statements and misrepresentation of facts on what transpired with the corpse of late Victoria Ogharibe and the hospital mortician.

THE FACTS

1. The corpse in question was an accident victim who was rejected in a private hospital and was subsequently rushed to our facility. She came unconscious with multiple fractures and injuries.
2. On getting to our hospital, our emergency staff tried all they could to resuscitate her but she gave up barely 2hours of arrival.
3. The fracture that was shown in the video involving thumb and index finger was due to the extent of the injuries sustained from the accident.
4. The creator of the video blatantly refused to tell his followers that the deceased was an accident victim with multiple injuries and fractures.
5. The maker of the video made heinous allegations but asked COOUTH Management to settle with the family. Does it mean that settlement with the family will exonerate all the allegations he made against our Hospital?
6. The case is currently under investigation by the State Criminal Investigation Department (SCID).
7. We will go to court to clear our name because we cannot allow few individuals who use social media to chase clout at the detriment of the image and reputation we have labored to build.

It is unfortunate that people these days create unnecessary scene for reasons best known to them. The family in their narrative never said that they were coerced in anyway. It is childish and unnecessary for them to later claim that they were persuaded to bury their dead.
